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

# The Royal Marines' Corner

## Zeebrugge 2008

‘They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old:  
Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.  
At the going down of the sun, and in the morning,  
We will remember them.’

These words, the fourth stanza of Englishman Robert Laurence Binyon’s immortal poem ‘To the Fallen’, rang out across the hushed silence of St James’ cemetery in Dover, Kent, England, on the morning of Friday 18<sup>th</sup> April 2008.

A small group of VIPs, Royal Marines Association members, Royal Marines, and Royal Marine bandsmen, paraded, with heads bowed in silent reverence, on a sunny April morning on a small plateau in the cemetery to commemorate one of the most historic events in our Corps history. The Zeebrugge Raid. It was hailed as one of the most daring and audacious raids of World War One.

The Raid, a bold plan conceived by Rear Admiral Roger (Later to become Sir Roger) Keyes, was carried out on the night of 22<sup>nd</sup>/ 23<sup>rd</sup> April 1918, some four years after Binyon’s poem was penned.

The 23<sup>rd</sup> April is St George’s day. (St George is the patron saint of England) and the raid was launched to coincide with that date. It was an operation designed to ‘twist the Dragon’s tail’ and involved some 70 odd ships from beaten up warships to motor boats and former Mersey ferry boats. The mission was to attack the port of Zeebrugge in German occupied Belgium and block it by sailing in three old warships packed with explosives and blowing them up at the entrance to the Brugge canal, denying its use by the German Navy’s destroyers and U Boats based in the city of Brugge.

The canal was the only access to the North sea for these vessels and Allied shipping had suffered heavy losses due to their activities over the previous months.

In brief, the raid involved the landing, on Belgian soil, of the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion Royal Marine Light Infantry, reinforced by Assault parties of Royal Navy Bluejackets – Royal Navy ratings trained in close quarter combat. Gunners from the Royal Marine Artillery formed many of the gun crews on the ships

Of the raiding fleet. (Both Royal Marines Light Infantry and Royal Marines Artillery were separate regiments at the time. They were both amalgamated in 1923 to become the Royal Marine Corps)

The assault parties were to be landed on Zeebrugge Mole to silence the many German gun emplacements which were put there to protect the port.

The mole was constructed to protect the port against the elements and the North Sea. It stretched from the Belgian coast outwards in a wide right handed arc approx. one mile long. A solitary lighthouse on the end of the mole, marked the harbour entrance. However in spite of courageous heroism above and beyond the call of duty, the raid was only a partial success due to a number of setbacks.

The smokescreen, set up to cover the approach of the raiding ships, was blown away when the wind changed direction at the last minute. Bad weather prevented the RAF from carrying out a bombing raid on the port to assist the attackers. A random searchlight beam picked up the leading vessel, star shells lit up the sky and some 144 German coastal artillery batteries opened up with a withering and devastating fire on the leading ships.

In the resulting confusion the assault parties of Royal Marines and Bluejackets were landed in the wrong location. In spite of the heavy casualties inflicted on them during the approach to the port the Royal Marines & Bluejackets stormed ashore in true Naval tradition and engaged the Germans in bitter hand to hand fighting.

Knives, weighted coshes and even old fashioned Naval Cutlasses were used in the bloody encounter that followed. In just over an hour over 300 men of the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion lay dead, dying or missing on the ships or on the Mole, along with countless numbers of Royal Navy personnel.

Two of the three blockade ships made the canal entrance and were blown up there. A submarine, the C3, also packed with explosive reached the viaduct linking the Mole with the Belgian coast and was also blown up, severing the link between the two. The raiding party then carried out a fighting retreat back to the ships and the raiding fleet, with many vessels badly damaged, limped back to Dover port.

Many of the dead Royal Marines and Navy personnel who took part in the Raid were buried in St James cemetery, Dover, Kent, England.

Many of the unidentifiable dead were buried in St Donaaskirk churchyard, in Zeebrugge, Belgium. As a mark of respect to their sheer guts, heroism and determination on that night, the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion Royal Marines Light Infantry was never formed again.

Eleven Victoria Crosses were awarded for outstanding bravery and heroism during the brief action. Rear Admiral Keyes received a Knighthood from the King.

The 23<sup>rd</sup> April, St George's Day was adopted as the Royal Marines Remembrance Day.

In recent years Royal Marines Associations from the City of London, Canterbury and Paddock Wood Branches have commemorated the anniversary of the raid every year, on the weekend closest to the 23<sup>rd</sup> April.

Beginning in Dover on the Friday morning, a brief memorial service is held in St James cemetery, Dover, Kent, England. Afterwards the RMA members and attached ranks travel over to Zeebrugge, Belgium for a weekend of parades, memorial services and functions at the kind invitation of the Zeebrugge 'Fest' Committee and the people of Zeebrugge.

This year, 2008, was different. It was the 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Raid.

A number of VIP guests accompanied the RMA this year, including His Excellency, Lieutenant General Sir R.G. Fulton KBE, Commander in Chief and Governor of Gibraltar.

Lt Gen.Fulton R.M. is the first 'Bootneck!' Or Royal Marine to be placed in charge of the 'Rock' in over 300 years, since its capture by Royal Marines and Dutch Marines in 1704, during the war of the Spanish Succession (1702 to1713.) Gibraltar is the only named battle honour of the Corps (It appears on our cap badge)

The other battle honours are represented by the Globe (Also on our Cap badge) since the Corps has too many battle honours to be named individually.

Lt Gen Fulton was accompanied by his wife and during the course of the weekend other VIPs including the UK military attaché to the Hague in Holland, the Mayors of Dover and the City of Brugge with other local dignitaries from the Brugge and Zeebrugge port, joined the commemoration services.

At this year's service in the cemetery, wreaths were laid, the Royal Marines prayer read out, the Last Post played and finally Reveille echoed across the wooded hillside and above the heads of the assembled ranks.

The RMA then climbed aboard their coach, drove to Dover port and boarded the 1240 hrs, P & O ferry for the port of Calais in France.

Once on board the members were given the VIP treatment and travelled 'Club Class' with champagne in abundance, and a finger buffet. The traditional 'Tot' of 'Nelsons Blood!' a very strong Navy Neaters rum did the rounds of all present.

After disembarking in Calais the RMA party were driven to Zeebrugge, Belgium where they disembarked their coach and dispersed to their allocated hotels.

A Dinner had been arranged for them in the Falstaff restaurant on Zeebrugge. Zeedijk. The dinner was attended by the VIP guests, the Zeebrugge Fest committee and the RMA party of course.

The units then moved to Fishermans Cross overlooking Zeebrugge port for a short service and the unveiling of a plaque to commemorate the Raid.

Fishermans Cross is a quiet corner of the port set aside for reflection and remembrance for those Belgian sailors who have lost their lives at sea over the past number of years.

It was considered an appropriate place for a memorial plaque as it overlooked the one remaining part of the original Mole, stormed by the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion 90 years previously.

This remaining part of the original mole is now preserved by the port in memory of the Raid.

When the Plaque ceremony was over the RMA party and VIPs were driven to the City of Brugge under a police escort for a reception in the town hall.

A welcoming speech by the Mayor of Brugge was followed by light refreshments including large quantities of the local beer! Brugge 'Zot' In Flemish this means Brugge fool!

The saying goes that if you drink enough of it, that's how you end up!

After the reception the RMA party were free to explore the city and sample its hospitality.

They returned to Zeebrugge later that evening with the usual police escort., where a small number of 'fools' had to be escorted to their rooms and put to bed by their shipmates!

On Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> April the RMA party assembled outside their respective hotels with suitcases and baggage packed and boarded their coach.

The coach drove in to Zeebrugge and the party disembarked outside St Donaaskirk for the final day of the Zeebrugge weekend.

A Commemoration service was held in the church, and a memorial service in the churchyard at the graves of the fallen. The churchyard holds the remains of those dead Royal Marines and Naval ratings who could not be identified after the raid.

Finally the marching party moved to Zeebrugge Town hall for a reception with speeches, prize giving and copious quantities of Brugge 'Zot'!

The local Zeebrugge schools hold a yearly competition amongst their pupils to find out which boy and which girl can write the most informative account of the Raid.

The participants have to work their way through some thirty pages of information in connection with that event.. The two winners are awarded their prizes at the Zeebrugge Town hall ceremony on the Sunday.


